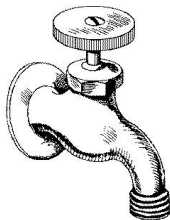
WHS November Speaker

"Innovations in Landscape Water Conservation"

Water is becoming more and more the liquid gold of California. With ever increasing droughts, watering wisely has become a mantra for the gardener. Tom Bressan is the Founder and President of The Urban Farmer Store, a 25 year old company with three stores selling irrigation solutions to municipalities, landscape professionals and homeowners. He has written numerous articles and handbooks on all aspects of irrigation, including Sunset magazines and Ortho books, and has served as a consultant for the book This Old House. He is currently a board member of the San Francisco Parks Trust, the EBMUD Landscape Advisory Committee and the SFPUC Appeals Board. CEU Credits

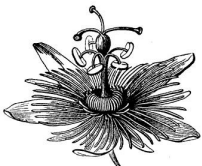

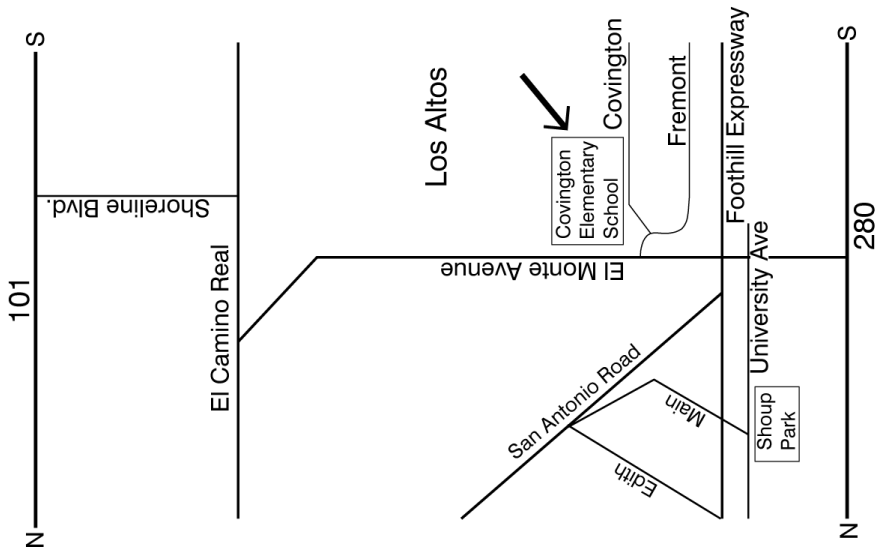
