#### "Bringing Succulents into the Garden"

Succulents, succulents everywhere and not a drop to drink! Succulents are setting the trend in many gardens these days and for good reason. As Patrick says, "With their ease of culture and fabulous variety of form, any gardener can create something wonderful with these exciting plants." With California's continued drought, succulents are showing up more often in our gardens; tucked here and there, they fit right in. Patrick's own succulent garden has been featured in numerous magazines such as *Horticulture, Sunset* and *Fine Gardening,* and the books *Desert Gardens* by Gary Lyons and Melba Levick; *Designing with Succulents* by Debra Lee Baldwin; and *New Garden Design* by Zahid Sardar and Marion Brenner. Founding member of the San Diego Horticultural Society and frequent volunteer at Quail Botanical Garden and the Huntington Botanical Garden, Patrick has had access to many succulents and succulent gardens to feed his enthusiasm for these beautiful and varied plants.

### 28 Years Ago

The October 12, 1981 WHS meeting featured Mildred Mathias, Emeritus Professor of Botany at UCLA bringing her "extensive knowledge of tropical America to us in her talk on AMERICAN RAIN FORESTS". (On a personal note, I heard this talk, or perhaps one a few years previous, and was so carried away by the enthusiasm showed for the topic, I seriously considered how I might join one of the Mathias expeditions into the *jungle*!) October was a good month for plant sales that year with announcements of one at UCSC Arboretum on Oct 10th, and Saratoga Horticultural Foundation on October 31st. Plants on the discussion table included a "Salvia guarantica, nutmeg sage, twice as big and lush as we have ever seen it before, the specimen was almost unrecognizable" (Question: should this have said S. guarantica, anise-scented sage?) brought by "Bartley Schwartz from his nursery in Concord", a great collection of natives from Yerba Buena Nursery brought by Gerda Isenberg, and two Osmanthus by Albert Wilson. *~Nancy Schramm*
