Owner of Larner Seeds, Bolinas, CA Author of The Landscaping Ideas of Jays and Gardening With a Wild Heart

“Landscaping Ideas of Jays: The Interface Between Ecology and Art in the Restoration Garden”

With global warming knocking at our door and a drought already in place, more and more gardeners are turning to beautiful native plants for their home gardens. Judith Larner Lowry has known the beauty of native plants all her life. She started Larner Seeds, the place to go for a wide array of native plant seeds, in 1977. Larner Seeds specializes in California native plants, many of which can be viewed in her demonstration garden. Her website says of Landscaping Ideas of Jays “Working in passionate collaboration with the scrub jays, quail, ants and deer who visit her garden, and inspired by

other gardeners, including some of the women pioneers of native plant horticulture, Lowry shares the delights of creating site-specific, ever-changing gardens that can help us better understand our place in the natural world.”

28 Years Ago...

In Sept 1980, WHS was still meeting at the Ampex Corporation cafeteria, in Redwood City. Ted Kipping was the speaker, with a program on "Tree Shaping: Theory and Practice". The plant discussion table featured fall flowering trees (*Duranta*, *Vitex*), shrubs (*Thevetia*, *Eriogonum*, several ornamental *Origanums*), and vines (*Clematis*, *Passiflora*, *Asarina*). The plant notes by Emily Brown included a number of tid-bits about *Thevetia*, usually grown in a container because it is tender to frost. Common names include "Yellow Oleander", "Be-still Tree", and "Lucky Nut". ~Nancy Schramm

Garden Making California-Style

Explore the opportunities and constraints of garden making California-style at **Gardening Under Mediterranean Skies VI: California! Saturday, October 11, 2008**. This one day symposium, co-sponsored by *Pacific Horticulture* magazine and The Mediterranean Garden Society (in concert with their international Annual General Meeting), offers a rare opportunity to meet gardeners from other Mediterranean climates of the world. The symposium will take place in stunning Monterey, the first California state capitol and a region rich in history and breathtaking beauty. Gardens have always been an important part of the developed landscape of this region where they compete for attention with the dramatic natural landscape of mountain and coastline, forest and dune.

David Fross, founder of Native Sons Nursery in Arroyo Grande, will present a morning session entitled “An Overview of the California Landscape and Flora” followed by “The History of California Gardens” presented by Russell Beatty, professor emeritus of Landscape Architecture and Environmental Planning at UC Berkeley and a consulting landscape architect in Santa Cruz, CA. Garden writer Ruth Chivers will wrap up the morning with a discussion of the issues challenging California garden makers today.

Complementing these programs will be an afternoon tour of gardens in Carmel and the Carmel Valley (including gardens by Michelle Comeau and Bernard Trainor) that demonstrate a clear response to the region's Mediterranean climate. The day's events will conclude with an evening lecture by Bart O'Brien, from the Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Garden and editor of *Fremontia*, entitled “Garden Jewels from the California Flora”.

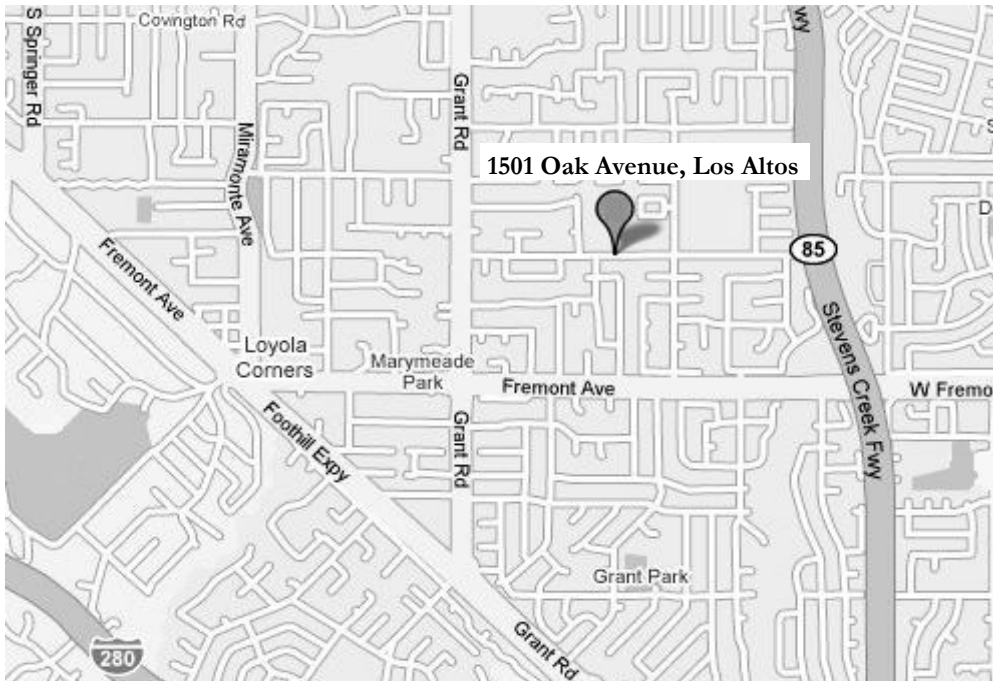
