### December 5: Betsy Fryberger

Burton and Deedee McMurtry Curator of Prints and Drawings, Iris & B. Gerald Cantor Center for Visual Arts, Stanford University.

### "A Taste for Citrus"

Citrus Trees have long been an essential feature in the garden landscape. This slide talk will start with how the Romans planted and used citrus, then during the Renaissance how be-

ing specialties of the Medici gardens their popularity spread. The lecture will conclude with a brief note on early California citrus groves. Betsy became interested in the relationship between gardens and artist's depictions of gardens nearly fifteen years ago. Over the years, she has traveled to many parts of the world to see sites represented in the prints, paintings, photographs and drawings she has studied giving her a unique perspective on arts and the landscapes. Betsy is also the



author of Picasso: Graphic Magician, Prints from the Norton Simon Collection (1999) and co-author of a book on the drawings collections of Stanford University.

# 28 Years Ago in the WHS ...

We learn from the November 1978 WHS newsletter that back then, 28 years ago, there was not only no December newsletter, there was also no December potluck meeting! It looks like the first annual potluck was in 1985. It's an event I look forward to, since there's so much more time to visit with WHS members. The November program was "Foliage and Berries from the Autumn Garden" presented by Emily Brown, along with Farley Barnes, a SJSU grad student who explained the mechanics of fall color. It also mentions that "Emily has been a member of this society since it was first formed and has been consistently active in it".

Since we just had a program from Bill Grant about roses (Nov 2006), it seems appropriate to look at the June 1978 newsletter which tells us that the Plant Discussion Table in May was covered with roses: "hardy, old shrub and climbing roses, species roses and allies, moss and tea roses". Wow! I counted at least 37 different ones listed (a "partial list" no less) and all were brought in by Betsy Clebsch and Barbara Worl. Emily Brown was writing the plant notes at that time, and wrote so eloquently about the "exquisite fragrance" (including the foliage of some--that's news to me) that I wish I had been there to see and smell the display. But then, maybe I was?! The June program (a meeting--no picnic in those days) was presented by Bartley Schwartz: "An Approach to Container Gardening". He used his "fine collection of slides" to "illustrate his unusual container plant materials." I'd love to see what was considered unusual in 1978!

<u>Note</u>: I'm proposing to write this '28 Years Ago' column on a regular basis. (One way to justify holding on to all these old newsletters!) The 'old timers' among us can reminisce, and the newcomers may learn something about the earlier days of WHS. Let me know what you think!
