January 14: Ellen McEnroe Zagory, Director of Horticulture at the UC Davis Arboretum, Davis, CA

"The UC Davis Arboretum: New Programs, Gardens, and Plants"

Director of Horticulture at the UC Davis Arboretum, Ellen Zagory serves as a spokesperson for the UC Davis Arboretum in their education and outreach program promoting more sustainable garden plants and practices. She has appeared on Hewell Howser's PBS "Road Trip", DIY TV and KFBK's Get Growing with Farmer Fred. She also has written a series for *Pacific Horticulture Magazine* on the UC Davis Arboretum All Star program, and travels the state lecturing to UCCE Master Gardeners and regional garden clubs about beautiful heat-tolerant and low-water-use plants. A resident and gardener in the Central Valley for the past 24 years and a knowledgeable horticulturist, she recently has become more interested in the interactions our gardens have with the fauna

of surrounding wild lands, and how our constructed landscapes can help support the biodiversity of native insects and other wildlife.

The January 1981 WHS meeting was on a Monday at the Ampex Corp Cafeteria in Redwood City. It seems fitting (since our Jan. 2009 speaker is Ellen McEnro Zagory, from Davis) that the speaker 28 years ago was also from Davis! Warren Roberts, Superintendent of the U.C. Davis Arboretum spoke about "Chilean Plants: Their Adaptability to Bay Area Gardens." Roberts' bio mentions that his tenure as Superintendent began in 1972; that means he celebrates his 37th year in 2009! Member and author Mabel Crittenden gave a "Thumbnail sketch of the genus Penstemon. Perfect drainage" was the most important recommendation for gardening success. Emily Brown's plant notes mention that "an obviously knowledgeable exhibitor, Mr. Willetts from Newark" brought in Lachenalia pendula. WHS members from the 80's may remember Michael Willetts and his passion for South African bulbs which led to his website and business 'Bulbmania'. Sadly, Michael died in August at the age of 71. # Growing Natives: Celebrating California's Beauty in Dry Times

#### March 28, 2009 – Lafayette Community Center, Lafayette March 29, 2009 – Regional Parks Botanic Garden, Berkeley

Creating beautiful waterwise gardens with California native plants will be the theme of this two-day symposium. The first day will include presentations on the flora of California (by botanist and author Glenn Keator), garden design (by author Carol Bornstein), the structure of the garden (by Phil van Soelen, from Cal Flora Nursery), herbaceous perennials and bulbs (by plantsman Roger Raiche), creating a native meadow (by David Amme), and connecting with the garden (by Mike Evans, from Tree of Life Nursery). The program will include a continental breakfast, lunch, and a wine reception.

The program at the Regional Parks Botanic Garden will begin with an inspiring talk by Director Steve Edwards, followed by a choice of workshops on plants for dry gardens, aesthetic pruning, principles of irrigation, and gardening practices. After lunch in the garden, the program will continue at Native Here Nursery with a presentation by Charli Danielsen and an opportunity to purchase plants. The day will end with an invitation to visit two private gardens: the Fleming garden in Berkeley and the Greenberg garden in Lafayette.
